
The murals will be constructed using broken ceramic pieces. Residents can help by contributing ceramic pieces such as chipped or broken dishes.

November 15th marked the end of an era in Esperanza Estates, when our neighbors, Steve and Nancy Brown, moved away for health reasons.

Steve, affectionately known as "Stoney," together with his wife Nancy moved to our neighborhood in 2002. We first learned of Stoney's arrival when we noticed that various problems in our common areas were mysteriously getting corrected by a volunteer who no one knew. We soon traced him down, however, and a short time later, convinced him to run for the Board, where he served until his recent health-related resignation. He served two full terms, and the majority of a third—nearly nine years. Most of that time, he was head of the Common Areas committee, in charge of our over-all subdivision maintenance and appearance.

Steve got his nickname from his talents doing stone work in many places in Esperanza Estates, all of it intricate and interesting. Examples may be seen along the edge of Arroyo Number 9, and on our walking trail, both on the south edge of EE. We expect this work will live for many years into the future, thus being a constant reminder of just one of the many things Stoney did for us while he was here.

Stoney was generous with his time and his talents. He went far beyond just supervising our landscaping crew, spending many hours doing actual physical labor—much of it hard and demanding. He frequently helped out many of our owners who needed assistance with yard work, never asking a penny in return. His reward was the appearance of Esperanza Estates, and he worked hard to keep it looking its very best. His work didn't make headlines—but it did make a difference. It made no difference to him that no one was watching his hard work.

The best way we can pay tribute to Stoney is to follow his example. Do your part to help Esperanza Estates where you can, and we'll all be richer for it.

Every subdivision needs a Stoney Brown. A person who is tireless and devoted. A person who will see things through. We are going to miss ours, but we thank him sincerely for all he did for us.

Goodbye, Stoney and Nancy. Your time here will always be remembered.

Photo of the Month Contest



Your Fascinating Neighbors

The Musicians of Esperanza Estates

Author's Note: I am writing this article in first person because the subject, EE musician lifestyles, is part of who I am. When I was a toddler, my momma would stand me up on the piano bench to sing songs I learned from the radio, like "Rudolph the Red-nosed Reindeer" and "Here Comes Peter Cottontail." It seemed like a game between us and I was oblivious to the fact that people were listening.

After a lifetime of singing, I have an encyclopedia of tunes and lyrics floating around in my head, and rarely a day passes by that I don't relate some fleeting moment to a song. [These marble - clad showers we have in EE make a great sound booth when I feel like belting one out.]

Two years ago I joined the alto section of the Green Valley Community Chorus [www.gvcommunitychorus.org]. This organization has a 30 year history and is home to some of the areas finest vocalists. Sometimes I wonder why they put up with me!

We are currently rehearsing for our Christmas concert, "Nowell," a program that incorporates a winsome variety of music from Frideric Handel to Mel Torme. Performances will take place at Valley Presbyterian Church on Monday, December 12 and 13. Tickets are \$10.00, and if you call me, I can fix you right up.

I am also singing in our church choir's Christmas Cantata, a Ralph Carmichael work titled "'Specially For Shepherds." Combined with a luncheon, performances will take place on December 8, 9 and 10 at noon at the Evangelical Free Church. The event is sold out, but I understand if you call the church they will put you on a waiting list.

As a music lover, I have also attended concerts by the Sons of Orpheus and the Green Valley Chamber Music society, and EE residents are part of those organizations as well.

Jim Kitchak is a member of the well-known Sons of Orpheus men's chorus of Tucson. They are beginning their 21st season of performing this fall, and this is Jim's fourth winter with them. The group is primarily known for its Christmas Concert series at Mission San Xavier, where they perform six concerts in three days (December 13,14,15) and are joined by the famous Tucson Boys Choir.

His group usually comes to Green Valley twice a year, at Christmas and again in the Spring. This season finds them at Quail



Creek on December 18th at 3 p.m. They also perform in December at Saddlebrooke, Tucson Estates and Mission San Xavier. Their Green Valley

spring concert is scheduled for April 22nd at Valley Presbyterian Church.

Jim began his connection with Orpheus by searching the internet for choruses in the Tucson/GV area. He had started a small men's group back in Racine, Wisconsin, and wanted to continue singing during the winters. After many emails with its founder and director, Grayson Hirst, Jim joined the group. He loves the many hours of hard work, both in group and at home, and the rewarding concert performances. He does not, however, love the trip to East Tucson twice a week for rehearsals. He often carpools with two other men from the GV area.

Jim finds singing a wonderful hobby as well as a 'mission' of making people happy through music. The group is also known for its charity concerts for the Community Food Bank, as well as U of A scholarships and work with the ASDB, the Arizona School for the Deaf and Blind. Other performances include the veteran's hospital in Tucson, the candlelight vigil for Pima County homicide victims, Pima Community College, Green Valley CPAC and many other venues.

The Green Valley Chamber Music Society [www.gvcms.org] is musical home for EE winter resident Patty Adler. The society is described as a group of music lovers in Green Valley who meet monthly to play for each other. The focus is primarily classical music. Members include former teachers or professional musicians as well as amateur musicians. And there are lots of enthusiastic listeners.

Patty plays the violin in the GVCMS orchestra, but enjoys performing in Celtic and bluegrass styles as well. She says she is the "official fiddler" for the Clan Johnston/e, and has performed at the Scottish-Irish Highland Festival for the last 10 years. She has also been known to take up her bow at special events in the neighborhood Ramada.

The society meets in the Parish Hall of the St. Francis-In-The-Valley Episcopal Church. Meetings are free and take place on the second Monday of each month at 9:45 a.m.

Former professional musician Richard Rose played with big bands in the Seattle area for almost 50 years. Though not currently active in musical circles, he carries a lifetime of memories of his days as a clarinetist and saxophonist. He studied music as a child, and began his adult music career when he passed the Navy's musician exam as a young recruit during the waning days of World War II. His assignment was to play with a navy band aboard the USS Midway on her maiden voyage. The ship is now a museum anchored in San Diego.

A recently published book, "Before Seattle Rocked" by Kurt Armbruster (available at www.amazon. com) studies the history of music in that area of the U.S. The author used information Richard provided, and one photo was selected for an exhibit at the Seattle Museum of History and Industry. It is a magnificent shot of young people enjoying the music of the Jackie Souders Orchestra taken in 1955, a time when full orchestral arrangements dominated popular music and dancing trends.

"Jackie treated us life family," he said. "He paid better than anybody, and his music was first-rate." In 1962, the Souders band was the official band of the Seattle World's Fair.

Rose's favorite colleague was Corky Corcoran, a tenor saxophone player with an international reputation who once played with Harry James. His favorite gig was the Aqua Follies of Green Lake. His band accompanied elaborate water ballet and Olympic caliber diving performances.

But by far his favorite memory is an early stint with the Seattle Elk's band, which brought Richard into contact with a dazzling baton twirler named Bonnie, who eventually became his wife. Bonnie was head majorette at her high school, 3-time state champion and 2-time national champion twirler. She now resides in an Alzheimers facility in Tucson, and he cherishes the memories of the years they marched together down streets in Washington State. Together they raised one daughter.

Gardening Resources

Feeling a little intimidated by gardening in Green Valley? Here are several places to go for some inspiration and good advice.

Pima County Cooperative Extension Service, 1100 W. White House Canyon Rd. Tour the demonstration garden which includes cactus, flowering plants and vegetables. The Master Gardeners hold a free plant clinic Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 12 noon when they are available to answer your questions on a walk-in basis or over the phone (648-0808).

Green Valley Gardeners' Arid Garden, Desert Hills, just off Camino Encanto. This one-acre demonstration garden includes over 600 low water, native and desert adapted plants, shrubs and trees. It is free and open to the public daily from dawn to dusk. Volunteers work in the garden every Friday from early morning until noon and will be happy to answer your questions.

Green Valley Gardeners Seminars, East Recreation Center, at the intersection of Abrego Drive and Esperanza Blvd. Weekly gardening seminars are held September through April on Thursday mornings from 9:30 to 10:30. All are free of charge and open to the public. The seminars cover a variety of gardening topics and are presented by horticulturalists, master gardeners, authors and growers from throughout the area. Master Gardeners are available to answer your questions. For more information on scheduled seminars, go to www.greenvalleygardeners.com.

The November meeting was interesting and informative. There were two speakers. The first speaker was Tom Kelley from Pima County Traffic Control. Mr. Kelley discussed the traffic issues surrounding the area on Continental from the La Canada intersection to the Post Office. The road allowing access to the Continental Mall is not really adequate for the job. The mall entrance and the Post Office access represent the two most traveled access roads in Green Valley. These roads are about two-thirds of a mile apart with four traffic lights in between. To reduce the chaos the County tried to optimize the traffic light patterns and in so doing made it slightly inconvenient for everyone. The inconvenience was characterized as about two minutes. The mess on the access ramp/road to the mall is more irritating to this writer.

The editor of the *Green Valley News* spoke about a project delving into the affect of the economic downturn on residents of Southern Arizona. The newspapers in Southern Arizona are contributing to the project and we will be seeing stories in the local papers.

On the 15th of December Edward Petrow, Jr. D.O. will present a program called "Feel Hip Again: Treatments for Hip and Knee Joint Pain." Reasons for hip and knee replacements will be presented as well as how the latest advancements can help us. The program will be presented at 2 p.m. at the East Center. Since all of us are falling apart, it might be worthwhile to listen to what might make our lives a little better.

I copied down the names of the GVC reps from our neighbors to the west on Portillo and to the east on Desert Bell. I think it would be of benefit to communicate and to find areas of common interest.

GVC is working towards banning bicycle traffic on the West Frontage Road in the interest of safety.

BUENOS AIRES NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

The Buenos Aires National Wildlife Refuge is an area of rippling grassland surrounded by mountains, and riparian (wetland) zones rich in bird life. The refuge is open for public use 24 hours a day. Go to www.fws.gov/southwest/refuges/arizona/buenosaires/ for further information about the refuge.

The Tucson Audubon Society conducts a free, mostly level, 2-mile bird walk at the refuge's Arivaca Cienga Trail (one-quarter mile east of Arivaca) every Saturday at 8:00 a.m., November through April. From Interstate 19, take the Amado/Arivaca exit west, turn right at the T, then left at the Cow Palace onto Arivaca Road. Then drive 23 miles to Arivaca. Arivaca Cienega Trail is one-quarter mile east of Arivaca.

EE Trash Survey Results

Board Meeting. Out of 236 surveys sent, 158 households (67%) responded.

On the question, "Would once weekly trash pickup be adequate for your needs?" Nearly 85% responded yes; 14% said no, and just over one percent didn't respond to this question.

Re: "What size container would you prefer?" 26% preferred a 30-40 gallon can (current Talking Trash size); nearly 20% preferred a 60-70 gallon can; almost 30% preferred a 95-gallon can (current Saguaro size); and almost 29% wanted inground can service. *Note: the survey did not address the pick-up of extra bags (such as yard waste) at no extra cost.*

Re: "How important is the cost of trash pickup service to you?" Main factor, almost 13%; a consideration, 73%; not relevant, 12%; just over one percent didn't respond to this question.

And, "If your yearly pickup could be substantially reduced from what you currently pay, with no reduction in service, would you be willing to pay annually for a contract with a single hauler that covered all of EE?" Yes, nearly 55%; No, almost 13%; prefer to pay quarterly, 25%.

Your Phone Calls Can Help Improve GV Roads

In a November 9th *Green Valley News* article, GV Council President Stan Riddle shed some light on the reasons behind the lack of road repairs and maintenance in Green Valley.

Riddle, along with members of the GVC Board and Executive Director, Sandy Richey, had recently met with Pima County Chief Administrator Chuck Huckelberry, members of his staff and the heads of all of the departments in the Public Works Department to discuss a number of issues that are of concern to the Council and Green Valley residents. The meeting produced some interesting facts:

- State shared Highway User Revenue Fund (HURF) monies, a compilation of gasoline, vehicle and income taxes, are the only source of county revenues for road repairs.
- The money available to the county for transportation needs today is less than it was eight years ago.
- The lack of repairs and maintenance is not unique to Green Valley. Every city, town and unincorporated county area is having the same problem when it comes to funding adequate road maintenance.
- The state is now funding two state agencies the Arizona Department of Public Safety and the Motor Vehicle Division of the Arizona Department of Transportation with money formerly available for road maintenance and repair. These state fund diversions total nearly \$12 million in the last three years, just for Pima County alone. The money could have repaired and repaved a number of roads in Green Valley.

"To help to alleviate this problem, we ask that you call on our representatives in the state Legislature—Sen. Frank Antenori and Reps. Ted Vogt and David Gowan— to initiate or support legislation that stops the diversion of HURF funds to balance the state budget and restore funds previously taken and require that these funds be used only for road maintenance and repair," Riddle wrote. "The Green Valley Council seeks your support in this important issue that not only affects our area, but the entire state of Arizona as well."
