

New EEHOA Financial Plan

Under the able leadership of Jim Copeland, we have finished the first phase of a new approach to future financial planning for the Esperanza Estates Homeowners Association.

The Association has been in operation for nearly 40 years and in that time we have accumulated a considerable experience base relative to the frequency and costs associated with the maintenance and replacement of the resources owned and operated by the Association. Jim, with the assistance of the volunteers currently responsible for these assets, as well as individuals who have had prior experience, has identified each HOA asset and compiled an estimate of when maintenance or replacement will be needed and an estimated cost for each asset. These estimates include our common areas as well as pool equipment and other HOA facilities such as the tennis/pickleball courts and the Ramada. In addition, a comprehensive analysis of quad driveways, for which the HOA is responsible, has been completed including the current condition of each driveway, dimensions and cost to repair or replace.

This information along with estimates of our regular annual costs of maintaining our common areas and operating our recreation facilities has been compiled along with projected income, into an Xcel spread sheet. This spread sheet gives us a relatively clear picture of our financial status for the next decade or so. Included in this financial plan is a quad driveway fund that is incremented annually. This should eliminate sudden unplanned demand for funds for this purpose. Also a contingency fund to deal with emergencies is also included.

These figures represent our best estimates relative to the costs and timing of necessary maintenance and repairs. Realistically however, the actual timing and costs will vary somewhat from the current estimates and we envision that this plan will require constant review and revision. On the other hand we feel that the information we have collected is sufficiently accurate that we can confidently predict our future financial status and estimate the timing and magnitude for future dues increases. Based on the current plan we do not feel that a dues increase is needed for 2015.

This should in turn result in a reasonably stable financial environment, free from erratic dues increases. As a result both the HOA and our homeowners should be able to do a better job of planning their financial futures.

This is a completely transparent process and I would be willing to discuss the details and share the spread sheet with anyone who might be interested. It is the hope of the Board that this process will increase the confidence of our members in the ability of the Board to manage the HOA and that there will be an improved understanding of our financial situation by all those involved.

George and his crew from Veliz Landscaping & Design planted the plants and installed water tank and watering system. The Green Valley Fire Department will refill the tank. George also brought some additional plants from his own stock. His company has done the planting on all of the medians since the program started eight years ago. Originally, we planned on doing the planting with volunteer labor. Instead, we decided to use smaller plants and have them professionally planted—good decision! All three of the vendors that we worked with were extremely helpful; they assisted us in completing our project within our limited budget. They are all civic-minded and a pleasure to deal with. They deserve our support. The volunteers from MedianGreen, headed by Suzanne Blodgett, provided support and expertise throughout the entire project. They have done a remarkable job in improving the beauty of Green Valley.

Now all we have to do is have patience and watch the plants grow!



Wildlife Watch: Howling Coyotes

As I write this we're starting to think of our return to Green Valley, later than usual this winter for family reasons. The flight is booked, the taxi to the airport arranged, and we just have two minor things to deal with – Christmas and New Year.

When we get back to Arizona the first sight of a Saguaro always lifts my spirits. And there are two sounds that let me know I'm back. One is the haunting hoot of a train whistle in the middle of the night, one of the USA's truly evocative sounds. The other is the noise of coyotes, yipping or howling as it gets towards day-break. It was lovely to read in the Monday Morning Memo that there's been increased evidence of them in the early mornings.

They used to be even more common, we were told by my wife Donna's Aunt Shirley who we bought our house from. She told us that when they first moved into EE not an evening or night would go by when they didn't hear the coyotes. What amazed them was that there would be a whole pack howling, and then they would all instantly stop at the same time, like a choir.

One reason coyotes howl is simply to find each other. They mostly live in small family groups, though when they're all calling together it can sound much larger. A typical group will only be an adult pair plus any young ones that haven't yet left to establish their own territories. It may sound like more, but in reality you'll normally only ever hear about 4-6 coyotes howling at the same time.

At night the pack will spread out and hunt separately, and from time to time will howl so they can locate each other. When it starts to get light they may call for longer so they can reunite.

A coyote pack will have its own territory but, especially in desert areas like ours, other packs will have neighboring territories. Another reason for the howling is to warn other packs they might be straying where they shouldn't, and that's also why the howling can be so intense. It's to establish how big and strong their own pack is, to warn off any potential intruders. If you hear two packs howling together, each telling the other to back off, then it can certainly sound like you're hearing one huge pack.

Coyotes can also howl when they've been surprised by a dog, as a defensive tactic. Incidentally, if you encounter a coyote while out walking, it will probably take the path of least resistance and get away from you. If it seems to stand its ground, it's probably just watching you to see what you do. It's best not to approach, in case the coyote's become more humanised and aggressive. If it's a hungry coyote, it may well go after a domestic dog or a cat, so watch your pet closely when coyotes are around.

Like owls, coyotes are thought of as nocturnal but while they do hunt mostly at night, you'll also see them during the day. If they didn't have a successful hunt the night before, and they get hungry, they'll go hunting in the daylight too.

But back to that howling. Do they howl at the moon? Despite the popular belief, no they don't. They like hunting on moonlit nights as it gives them more opportunities, so they may be more active and howl more – but it's not at the moon. Humans are more likely to see as well as hear coyotes howling when the moon is bright, but that's just us humans putting the two things together and creating a connection.

On the other hand, there is another reason coyotes howl: for the sheer fun of it, and because they feel like it. Well, I hope they feel like it when we return. It always sounds like a welcome back to Green Valley for us.

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
