

GVC Summer Activities Introducing the Preferred Vendor Program

As usual, GVC has been fairly quiet this summer, but I have heard rumblings that a proposal will be made to the HOA's with County-owned streets. I don't know for sure what it will entail, but I will keep you informed.

Almost every day I see on the Esperanza Estates Nextdoor site someone asking for help locating service providers, such as handyman, contractor, etc. GVC has instituted a home service (like Angie's List). GVC vets these all contractors before enrolling them. The Preferred Vendor Program can be found on the GVC website with over 200 service providers. This program is a funding source for GVC. The contractors pay to be listed. GVC will mediate any issues you have with the contractors. I think that using the Nextdoor listserve is a good idea, but using the Preferred Program vendors can only help you. Go to GVC's website (gvcc.org), scroll down to the quick links and click on "Preferred Vendor Program." Register (free) and look for the kind of home service you need. If we use the service, more contractors will want to be on the list and GVC will have more clout with the contractors.

Restaurant Review: Baja Café

Earlier this summer there was a posting on Next-Door about a website for unusual places in your state. Curious, I went to www.onlyinyourstate.com/arizona. Voila! All sorts of information on unique features of our state. Since I enjoy breakfast out, I selected that topic and found "These 10 Restaurants in AZ Prove That Brunch is the Best Meal of the Day." Three restaurants were located in Tucson, so I looked at those and chose the one closest to where our business appointment was.

The Baja Café on Broadway was a welcome treat. They serve breakfast all day. Breakfast items include from the griddle, unique eggs benedict, specialties and



stacks made with hash browns. Lunch items include burgers and sandwiches and tacos. Specialty cocktails and beverages round out the multi-page menus. Monday-Friday specials are from 6 a.m. to 10 a.m.

Our first time there my husband, Bob, chose "The Wile E. Coyote," a grilled chorizo tamale cake topped with Hatch green chilies, jalapeno bacon, one poached egg smothered in the housemade chipotle hollandaise sauce, served with hash browns. Very flavorful! (We are now on the search for jalapeno bacon!) My choice was "Huevos Rancheros," two corn tortillas topped with black bean sauce, two eggs cooked any style, cheddar and jack cheese tomatillo sauce and a New Mexican sauce topped with Pico de Gallo, served with hash browns. Very delicious! And, because it was our first visit, the waiter brought us a complimentary snickerdoodle pancake that was out of this world! It was an inch thick filled with flavor and covered the plate.

On our second visit Bob ordered the special which was the "Smokehouse Chile Benedict:" brisket layered over cornbread with chorizo and cheddar jack cheese and Pico de Gallo. (Portion size for two!) I selected a blander fare: "Dustdevil Scrambler:" a blend of veggies and meat of the day scrambled with eggs served with hash browns and a choice of toast, biscuit, or English muffin. (We should have ordered a snickerdoodle pancake, too!)

The ambiance was that of a small, locally-owned restaurant. The waiters were friendly and attentive, and they definitely knew the "locals" or regular customers. Waiters effectively described their daily specials. We recommend you ask the price of those specials so as not to be surprised.

Customers were of all ages, from children to senior citizens. A toy box was included in one of the dining areas. In addition to the two interior dining rooms there was an outside seating area with umbrellas. Seating in each area was around 25 people. Walls were painted brick with large signs proclaiming CAFÉ, EAT, DINE.

Would we return? Yes, definitely! And we would select a Mexican entrée because they are so flavorful.

Baja Café on 7002 E. Broadway Blvd., Tucson, AZ 85710 is located behind the Gaslight Theater in a strip mall. It is open daily from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m. for breakfast and lunch. Phone: 520-495-4772. Their website lists a second location at 2970 N. Campbell Ave., Tucson, AZ 85719, but we have not tried that spot.



Stein Simonson caught three of these salmon beauties at the mouth of the Columbia River in Oregon.





Suzanne Keitzer: A Woman on a Mission

Do you want to travel to exotic places and experience different cultures? Would you like to ease the suffering of people living in poverty by providing food, medical care and education? Most of us talk about it. Many of us send money to organizations dedicated to humanitarian causes. But who among us packs a bag and goes? EE resident Suzanne Keitzer has been involved in Christian missionary work around the globe for 23 years. Until her husband's death last year, they were a missionary couple.

"We were home from assignment just one day when Ron died suddenly. It is difficult to continue this work without him, but our shared commitment to serving the Lord compels me to do what I can for as long as I can."

Pennsylvanians Ron and Suzanne settled in EE in 1990 and began life here in typical fashion. "We were the youngest couple in the neighborhood at that time. Ron retired early and I was unable to work because of neurological deficits brought on by brain surgery. Our salary days were over. We started this chapter expecting to relax and live frugally until our time was up. God had other plans though," she said.

For four years, they were involved in volunteer work and community activities. Suzanne sang in the Community Chorus and served on the Green Valley Coordinating Council. Ron did maintenance work for a rental agency. They had friends and busy social lives. In 1994, everything changed.

"Some friends told us about a missionary base in Hawaii where you could volunteer and live for nothing. We saw an opportunity to see the islands for the cost of an air ticket. We applied, half expecting to be turned away, but we were accepted. This was not the voice of God talking to us from a burning bush. Instead, it was God meeting us where we were. When we checked into the Youth With a Mission base in Kona, we expected to do some laundry, fix some leaks and go home with some memories. In fact, it was the beginning of the most exciting adventure we could have ever imagined."

Responding to a variety of calls, the Keitzers have been on short and long term assignments to Fiji, China, Switzerland, Dominican Republic, Australia, Guatemala, Mexico, Brazil and Romania. They were on staff at a YWAM (Youth With A Mission) base in Chico, California for five years.

Reminiscing about their time in Guatemala, Suzanne said it was probably her favorite short term assignment. The couple traveled there three times with a medical team. "It was the worst living conditions I have ever experienced. They drank the same water the livestock used. The people were malnourished and sick. They would wait for hours in deep mud and rain to access the basic remedies the missionaries provided. But the joy and gratitude they expressed was unbelievable. The people were just incredibly loving."

The Keitzers trained for their various roles through the YWAM organization. Entry level participation is a category called Mission Builders. Volunteers perform functions to support the infrastructure that

enables missionaries to live and train at base camps. They provide clerical support, laundry, food service, facility maintenance, transportation, and similar duties.

The opportunity to become English teachers was the Keitzer's next call. Foreign students with limited English speaking skills participate in ESL (English as a Second Language) classes at YWAM bases all over the globe. By becoming certified, the Keitzers opened doors to serve around the world and to interact with people from a variety of cultures.

They served in China for a year, where they taught English to university students. While on campus, they were under surveillance. They were locked in at night. Phones were tapped. The only place they could communicate freely about spiritual matters was in their apartment.

They kept a schedule for visitors to their home during free time to control the numbers. "Chinese people are drawn to foreigners. They wanted to touch us, to have their pictures taken with us, to converse with us about America. We pray that, by offering friendship, we planted seeds for faith in God to grow," she said.

Their next call was Discipleship Training School, extensive training in methods to share Christianity. In 2006, Ron told Suzanne he sensed God's call to step up. The school was expensive and beyond their reach, but after they reviewed their assets, they were amazed to find the money was available after all. "When God has a plan, He provides the way," Suzanne said. "It is traditional for missionaries to raise funds from friends and church boards, but Ron and I were never comfortable asking for money."

They took DTS in Chico, then went to Fiji for field training. "There are people groups in Fiji who were originally taken there from India to serve as slaves. They are looked down upon and live in wretched conditions, but we saw the power of God at work there."


The Keitzers participated in a local church ministry project in Romania in 2014. The work there involved renovation of a building to be used as a Christian community center. Several Green Valley people stayed for six weeks to roll up their sleeves and do construction work. "I was a gopher," Suzanne laughs. "It was strangely gratifying work."

In 2015 after Ron died, Suzanne traveled to Dominican Republic to participate in a sweeping evangelism movement called One Nation, One Day. Eleven jets filled with more than a thousand volunteers canvased the country preaching the gospel and meeting needs. "We distributed Bibles and shoes. We conducted health clinics. We sang. We prayed. The people were very welcoming," Suzanne remembers.

Suzanne recently had a garage sale and occasionally dog sits to raise funds to travel to East Germa-

ny in September. She will teach English, possibly to Muslim refugee groups, with an American YWAM team. "Our apartments will be on the fourth floor of a building with no elevators, so I need to get in condition for climbing stairs," she quips.

With her faith and perseverance, there can be no doubt she will find the strength, the resources and the motivation to change some more lives. Ron would want it that way.




